## **Geography Department**

### Sicily Trip - a Sixth Year's perspective

After a very early flight, we landed in Sicily and then went straight on the bus to a local farm. Here we got to visit olive groves, orange groves and artichoke fields. We then got to have a delicious lunch that had been made from all fresh produce from the farm. After lunch, we had the chance to see the donkeys being milked and to sample some of the milk.



On our second day, we had another early 6am start for a boat trip to Lipari. Here we got to do some sightseeing and have some cool ice cream of every flavour imaginable. We then got back on the boat and headed to the small island of Vulcano, where we hiked up the mountain and got the chance to stand on the edge of the crater. We then made our way back down the mountain and had a refreshing swim in the sea. By the time we were leaving Vulcano, we had just about got used to the smell of rotten eggs from the sulphurous gases.

On our third day we got to have a little lie in until 7am, before a walking tour of Catania and then a visit to the Institute of Geophysics and Volcanology. This was one of the highlights of the trip, as we got to see how the research is carried out and how the volcanoes and earthquakes in the area are monitored. We then got on the bus to Mt. Etna. After we had all prepared ourselves to go up the tallest active volcano in Europe, we boarded the cable cars and then hiked up to one of the many craters on Mt Etna. When we came back down we got to go to the new 7D simulator room, where we were in a simulated volcanic eruption. On our second last day we got to visit the famous Alcantara Gorges which were made from an old eruption, more than two thousand years ago.

At 4.30am we got on the bus for the last time and tried to get catch up on some sleep before we got to Palermo airport for our flight to back Dublin.

## **Green Schools**

Over the next two academic years the Green Schools team will be trying to get the travel flag for the school - our fourth flag. Saint Mary's has three green flags for recycling, energy and water. We will be trying to make the travelling habits of our staff, students and parents more environmentally friendly. We are currently in the process of identifying targets to aim for to get our flag. ### **Science Department**

Science students in St.Mary's were run off their feet during over the past few weeks. Between the national Science Week activities which ran from Monday 9th to Friday 13th November, normal science class practicals and the highly successful science trip to London, it was an action packed autumn.



It was the first time a science tour headed off to the bright lights of London. Over the three day tour, the students visited several significant scientific sites. Greenwich is notable for given its name to the Greenwich Meridian (0\* longitude) and Greenwich mean time (GMT). Here, the students watched a video of the Big Bang and they wandered around the exhibits.

The Natural History Museum first opened its doors in 1881. It is one of Britain's most striking examples of Rom-



anesque architecture, and is considered a work of art in its own right. The museum has become one of London's most iconic landmarks. In 1856 Sir Richard Owen, a brilliant natural scientist who came up with the name for dinosaurs, left his role as curator of the Hunterian Mu-

seum and took charge of the British Museum's natural history collection.

The students saw a life size marble statue of him and of course, of Charles Darwin,

who is credited with coming up with the initial idea and understanding of Evolution.



Next door, is the science museum, in which our girls participated in different activities and got stuck into some exciting science experiments. The "Centre of the Cell" is an interactive model of a cell, full of information and computer simulations of how our body

works. It is housed in the working laboratories of Queen Mary university right in the heart of London.

To conclude our tour, the girls energetically threw themselves into gravity experiments



by engaging with all of the crazy rollercoasters found in Thorpe park. The teachers present, Ms McCormack, Ms. Nolan, Ms. O'Donnell, Ms. O'Keeffe and Ms. Coleman, cautiously watched over all of these practicals to ensure health and safety rules were being observed!

Science Week was a busy affair. Students competed in а poetry competition, lunchtime dissections, activities in DCU and the Botanic Gardens, careers talks and TYs had a private viewing of" The Martian" in the local cinema. Many all involved. thanks to



### THE EMBER TEAM -

### A New Initiative for St. Mary's.

Eight current 5th year students were selected from interview to be part of the Ember Programme. The successful students were:

Edel Sintos, Roisin Byrne, Lisa Fitzsimons, Karen Parjarillo, Angel Molina, Olwyn Galbraith, Amy Ray, and Sally Ahern.

The Ember Programme is a faith leadership training programme for students at senior level in secondary schools. The students are trained to become faith leaders in their schools and in some cases they act as mentors for incoming students at Junior Level. This programme is coordinated by the Archdiocese of Dublin Education Secretariat and has been developed in partnership with a number of professionals who engage with young people in a faith capacity. The Archbishop of Dublin sanctioned the programme to be increased from six schools to fourteen this year and St. Mary's was invited to be included as one of the new schools to be involved in the programme. Last year the School set up a Liturgical group made up of 5th year students and the Ember programme seemed to be a natural development of this group. As part of this programme the students would receive the training and supports from the Archdiocese under the guidance of the Post Primary Diocesan Adviser Anna Maloney.

Hence from the 2nd- 4th June 2015, six of the fourteen schools in this year's programme took part in the training in Avoca, Co. Wicklow. The students took part in team building activities with members of Scripture Union in Avoca. Then within small groups they looked at effective planning strategies and good listening skills. Each evening ended with a reflective liturgy and at the close of the programme on the Thursday Bishop Eamon Walsh commissioned the new teams and presented them with their certificates and badges. They then returned to their schools in September to being their work as peer leaders promoting faith and ethos based activities in the school.

Before the commissioning the girls from St. Mary's elected their Chairperson, Secretary and PRO. The results were: Roisin Byrne as Chair, Angela Molina as Secretary and Olwyn Galbraith as PRO.

## **Art Department**

The Art Department at St .Mary's was delighted to be invited to represent Creative Engagement Project for The NAPD at Feilte, the Teachers' Conference, in the RDS in September. Mylene Hayes and Enoh Brownson represented their year group and displayed 'Flight', a porcelain installation created in collaboration with artist Isobel Egan.



Our first year art students have studied the art elements and focused on observational drawings and painting techniques. They have explored form and textures in natural and manmade objects. Second year students have revised drawing techniques with an emphasis on geometric shape. They have used these studies to develop their understanding of 3D form and constructed interesting architectural structures. Second year art students have also examined the proportions of the face and created portraits. Our third year students have begun to explore and develop their Junior Certificate art themes. **Sacred Spaces'** is a creative collaboration between transition year students, Architect-in-Residence, Evelyn D'Arcy, historian, Dr.Jacinta Prunty and the art department.


### 3. 1916 Writing Group

As part of the school's centenary celebrations for 1916, a group of enthusiastic students have formed a scriptwriting group. Here they are collaborating, brainstorming and researching in order to create the script for the 1916 Rising production. These scenes range from Maud Gonne's rejection of W.B. Yeats in favour of the military leader John MacBride to the poignant wedding between Grace Gifford and Joseph Plunkett on the eve of his execution. This is the first time a scriptwriting group has been formed to work on the play and we look forward to watching its creative efforts come to life in the acting rehearsals!

### 4. T.Y. English

T.Y. students are getting the opportunity to experience English in many creative and exciting ways. Three subject modules have been especially designed to help them develop their writing skills and personal response to literature; Creative Story Writing with Mr. O'Connell, 1960's America in Literature, Song and Images with Ms. Nolan and Shakespeare's Life and Works with Ms. Murtagh. Students also participate in reading classes on Catherine Stockett's "The Help" and a Reading for Pleasure module in the library. During their drama module with Ms. Callan, students are developing their screenplay writing skills and working on their first short films, in preparation for collaboration with "Create Schools" later in the year.
