TY Log on, Learn (TY LOL)



Well done to the girls of class 4.38 who participated in the Transition Year Log on, Learn initiative. TY LOL was developed as a result of collaboration between Intel, Microsoft and An Post. It involves Transition Year Students teaching computers to older people from their local community. It works using a "buddy" system whereby each student is paired with an older person so that training is on a one-to-one basis.

The programme was a huge success and we already have a waiting list for next year. The key to its success and indeed, the magic ingredient was the co-operation between the two generations involved. It is seldom that these two generations get the opportunity to work together outside the realm of family environments, but from the get-go there was a real buzz in the computer room and a sense that both groups were enjoying the task at hand.

I have to hand it to the transition year students, most of whom had never done anything like this before. It is not an easy job to take on the role of teacher, but they did a fantastic job. I could see many qualities of a good teacher shining through - patience, ability to listen to their buddies and generosity in imparting their knowledge. Some of them should definitely consider a career in training or teaching.

We also had a marvellous group of participants who weathered the early mornings and some very cold temperatures to join us every Wednesday. They were all a pleasure to work with. I know that there can be a big fear factor involved in learning to work with computers, but everyone got stuck in with enthusiasm. What struck me most was that in a school full of young people, it was the so-called older people who stood out as being full of energy first thing in the morning! ART DEPARTMENT

First year students have been developing their observational drawing skills since January with Ms. Garvey and Ms. Cunningham. Focusing on the proportions of the face each class has created a vibrant selfportrait using a variety of materials



Using individual themes as a starting point, Ms. Garvey's second and fifth year students studied product design, brainstormed with a series of thumbnail drawings and then developed their ideas into sophisticated perfume bottle designs. They then looked at advertising and graphic design and each student created a poster to promote their perfume. Ms. Garvey's second years also constructed three dimensional paper mache head sculptures using their life drawings as a source.

Ms. Cunningham's second years worked on two crosscurricular projects. The first was based on 'Romeo and Juliet' and was in collaboration with the English department. The aim of this project was to use contemporary graphic design and calligraphy as a visual means to reinforce students' study of Shakespeare's play. Each student took a quote from the play as their subject matter. The quotes were displayed around the school, helping Junior Certificate students with their studies. The second project was in collaboration with the Science department, linking in with the physiology section of the Biology course. Students studied the proportions of the human form through a variety of drawing techniques. They worked in groups to construct three skeletons. They labelled the bones and the skeletons were displayed in the two Science labs and in the Art

Their creations were highly praised by the judging panel. In May both classes visited the National Museum and IMMA as part of their Leaving Certificate Art History course.


Darwin Dav

DEPARTMENT OF GUIDANCE & COUNSELLING

At this time of the year we are planning on welcoming our new group of First Year students to St. Mary's. To help facilitate the transition from Primary to Secondary we are visiting the primary schools and talking with the Sixth Class teachers about the students' progress and interests. There was a very positive information meeting with the parents of incoming First Years and many signed up for an informal interview with us at the end of May.

There was a meeting with the parents of the present First Year students to look at subject choice. The counsellors also met with the students and distributed booklets about their subjects.

The Third Year students sat their Differential Aptitude tests (DATS). This was to help those going on into Fifth Year with making their subject choice. They each received a booklet outlining what was involved in the study of subjects for the Traditional Leaving Certificate. Each Third Year student had a meeting with the guidance counsellors to receive feed back on the results of the DATS. The Third Year students with their parents attended a meeting to look at the options for next year: Transition Year; Fifth Year; LCVP.

Tolka Area Partnership (TAP) formerly Finglas Cabra Partnership

Choices programmes

TAP have funded tutorials for students from the area to help with honours Maths at Junior cycle and to facilitate senior cycle students who have taken up a science subject to reach an equivalent standard as their peers. These students wish to pursue a career in Nursing and this will keep this possibility open to them.

Opt in Youth Programme

Three of our students took part in the final graduation that took place in the Finglas Resource Centre. This programme has run in Finglas and Cabra for the past fourteen years. It has helped hundreds of young people to stay in education. "Opt In" was the only programme of its kind in Ireland. The funding was cancelled by the Minister of Education and Science.

The summer programme gave young people the opportunity over a ten-week period to stay in education and further their confidence, skills and talents. It also supported the students over their remaining years in school with Follow up Days and one to one meetings with the students.

It is a very short sighted move that will incur far greater expenditure in the long term in order to help these young people.

16+Task Force

The 16+ Task Force was formed in 2007 to address the need for a multi-agency approach to meet the needs of young people aged 16 and over who are disengaged or at risk of disengaging from

service providers. It aimed to create a structure and process to work with individuals placing paramount importance on their best interests. The task force has established a Service Directory that maps out the roles of the services in the area and provides a simple and effective point of contact for other agencies and the young people in the Finglas Cabra area. St Mary's is one of the services included in the directory and has been actively involved in the Task Force.
