ART DEPARTMENT

The art department and first year art students participated in "The Creative Engagement Project 2014", supported by the N.A.P.D, The Department of Education and Science and The Department of Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht. It was a wonderful creative experience for all involved. We were delighted to invite ceramist Isobel Egan, our Artist-In-Residence, to work with our first year students. The result of this unique creative collaboration is a porcelain installation, "Flight". It was opened by Mr. Dermot Carney, N.A.P.D and is in situ beneath the staircase close to the school reception. Each student contributed to this inspirational sculpture by making three porcelain butterflies. The translucent nature of the porcelain allows the colours, pattern and textures of each butterfly to shine through. The subtle movement of the flight of the butterfly is captured in the gentle folding of each wing.

'Flight' is a suspended artwork that encourages the viewer to enjoy it from a variety of different perspectives. Inspiration for the sculpture was taken from The Botanic Gardens and St. Mary's sensory garden. It is quite fitting that such a unique, positive and natural artwork is dedicated to our beloved and inspirational Deputy Principal, Anne Murphy.

Second year students have focused their energies on painting portraits. The work demonstrates versatility with the application of several art mediums. There is evidence of fine skill, attention to detail and personal expression. Students used acrylics, watercolours, pencils, oil pastel, inks and paint to achieve their individual realisations of the human face. Following on from this project artwork was created using mono-printing and porcelain as craft mediums.

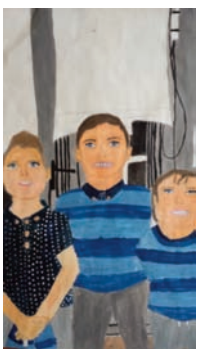
MISSION STATEMENT

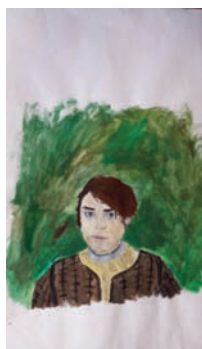

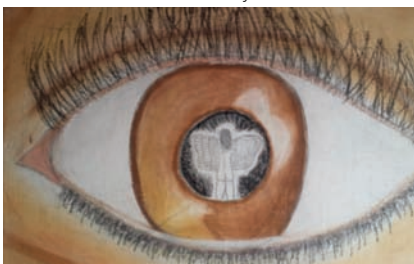

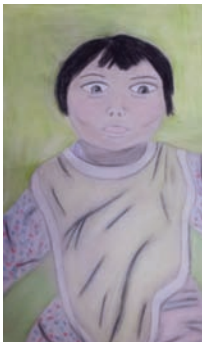

Junior Certificate project deadline in May with work that they should be very proud to have created. The drawing exam allowed the students to portray their observational skills while studying the forms of both natural and man-made objects. The art project enables each student to explore and become proficient in several two dimensional and three dimensional art disciplines. It promotes self-directed learning, research based study and creative problem solving.

The transition year art module continued with further work on, 'My Architecture Design Journal', a project initiated by The Architects Association of Ireland. Students had to study a design brief that asked them to create a series of interesting spaces. After brainstorming several concepts students used their numeracy skills to measure, calculate and draw their architectural designs. These studies evolved into architectural forms that were manipulated, cut, folded and constructed into original buildings and unique spaces. Transition year students also worked with our Artist-In-Residence, Isobel Egan, creating a beautiful porcelain wall-mounted artwork inspired by Glasnevin and the surrounding area.

Fifth year art students participated in the Amnesty International, 'Voice Your Concern' project. Each student made a visual response to 'The Declaration of Human Rights'. The school community was invited to make a comment on the exhibited imaginative compositions which explored themes relating to the universal respect for human dignity and the rights of the individual. The project challenged students to develop subject matter relating to the Declaration and to communicate it visually. The response to this interesting series of work acknowledges the commitment and artistic talent evident within our school community.

In May our sixth year art students sat their Leaving Certificate practical exams. They were required to realise a still life composition, a series of life drawings and to create a finished piece of craftwork. The art history and appreciation exam will take place in June. We wish all students success in their exams and commend them on all their hard work and achievements.

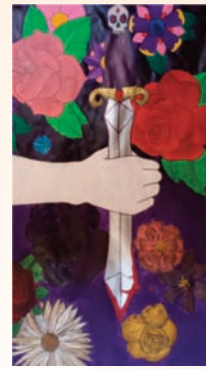

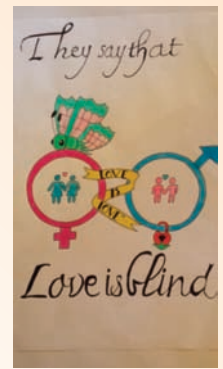

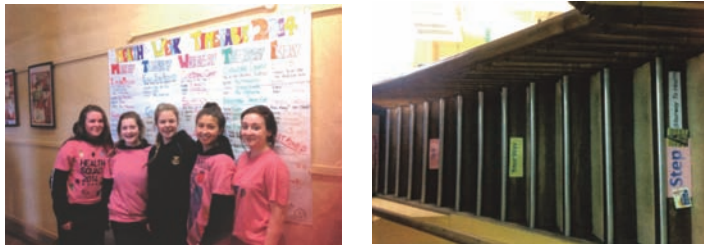

St. Mary's was a buzz of activity during our annual Health Week which took place from the 23rd to 28th of January – a great way to kick off the New Year. Activities like the Early Bird Run, Guessing Games and the Million Step Challenge got the girls up and going at lunchtime and after school. Health week promotes a healthy diet with free fruity snacks supplied at break time – a real treat for the girls. We hope that they continue to stay fit and eat healthily, (most of the time anyway).

St. Mary's One Million Step Challenge

This year during Health Week St. Mary's took on a new challenge of one million steps in five days. We asked a group of twenty participants to volunteer. It was made up of eight teachers and twelve students. The challenge involved twenty participants who would walk for five days and achieve ten thousand steps a day which would equal one million steps! Their progress was monitored every day by Pedometers. (Twenty participants x five days x ten thousand steps a day = one million steps!)

We wanted the St. Mary's group of twenty to challenge themselves to hit the ten thousand step mark every day for five days in a row, and therefore the overall group would walk one million steps.

Research shows that walking ten thousand steps a day will significantly improve your health, but most of us only walk between three thousand and four thousand steps per day. Therefore ten thousand steps per day certainly was a challenge for all the volunteers!

We were delighted, not only to achieve our target but to beat it with a total number of one million, two hundred and thirty one thousand, four hundred and twenty three steps achieved. This is a fantastic achievement for our First Step Challenge in St. Mary's and a big thank you to all our student and teacher participants. Keep on stepping!

St. Mary's P.P. School, Holy Faith Convent, Glasnevin, is well-known for its academic achievements down the years, and also boasts a noteworthy tradition on the sporting front. Hockey, basketball and tennis are sports at which pupils have made their imprint, and there have also been important successes.

Another very interesting feature of the scene is that several past pupils have made a career of their favourite outside school pastime by becoming P.E. teachers. All the P.E. teachers at the school are past pupils.

The school colours are Royal Blue Skirt and White Blouse, and teams have been competing in the Holy Faith Games League since 1938.

TWELVE TEAMS

At present, 12 teams in all are fielded in hockey and basketball competitions. These are as follows :—

HOCKEY—Senior, Intermediate, Junior "A" and Junior "B", Minor "A" and Minor "B". These teams compete in the Holy Faith Hockey League and the Leinster Hockey League.

BASKETBALL—Senior "A", Senior "B", Cadette "A" and Cadette "B" and Junior "A" and Junior "B". The basketball teams compete in the basketball league.

Team captains are Mary Collins in hockey and Anne Phelan in basketball.

The school has two grounds, one an all weather pitch, and the other a grass pitch.

The junior and minor hockey teams finished runners-up in the Holy Faith League in 1970-71, and the minor hockey team reached the quarter finals of the Leinster League in 1971.

In tennis, the school has won the Senior Cup (Holy Faith Inter-Schools' Tennis) no fewer than 12 times since 1946. This is a splendid achievement by any measurement.

The school is also making a great contribution towards solving the problem of long summer holidays and occupation for the young.

A new Tennis Club, St. Mary's, was recently launched. The club has eight courts, beautiful changing facilities, and a club room and shop. The court's are well-marked out on the school's all-weather hockey pitch, already spotlighted above.

This tennis club is distinct from the school in that it operates only during the holidays, and that membership is confined to those who have or had some connection with the school.

As well as providing valuable recreational facilities in this direction during the summer, the school is setting an outstanding headline. Under this arrangement, recreational facilities are being fully exploited during the year, instead of remaining idle for some months — as is so often the case.

The school's aim is to enjoy sport and games at all times. And, it is succeeding admirably in this objective.

A school with a great past, and one with an exciting future . . . that, in short, is St. Mary's P.P. School, Holy Faith Convent, Glasnevin.

Camogie

This year, for the first time, St. Mary's entered a team into the Dublin Senior post primary camogie championship. Each year in the school was represented on this team. It played its first competitive match in October. The team got off to a promising start before Christmas and had an unbeaten record in its group matches. St. Mary's recorded comprehensive victories over Confey College Leixlip, Holy Faith, Clontarf and Hartstown C.S.

After the Christmas break the girls faced a tough challenge in the semi-final which was played on the Farnham Drive pitch in Finglas. Loreto, St. Stephen's Green, proved to be a very strong opposition. The game was very close and St. Mary's had to work very hard to overcome this challenge. Through hard work and determination St. Mary's earned themselves a place in the final winning the semi-final by only one point in the final minutes.

The final was equally as nail-biting. Our opposition once again was Holy Faith Clontarf. On the day the St. Mary's team travelled to Clontarf. The team suffered a blow in that its goal keeper, Saoirse Devlin, was unable to play due to injury. This set back and the challenge which the girls faced required strong leadership and belief on the day. Although at times during the final St. Mary's were behind, they never gave up. Each player showed determination and pride in her team and the school. The spirit and team work that the girls showed during the game paid off when they were again, only one point ahead at the final whistle. Our captain, Aoife Reilly, made an acceptance speech in front of her team mates, parents, families and of course our supporters. They came along with Mr. Beirne and Ms. Coughlan and were very loud and supportive on the day. The girls will be presented with their medals later in the year.

On Wednesday 9th April, all one hundred and thirty third year students attended a screening of the newly released version of “Romeo and Juliet” in the I.F.I cinema in Temple Bar.

Directed by Carlo Carlei, the film starred Douglas Booth as Romeo and Hailee Steinfeld as Juliet. It also featured

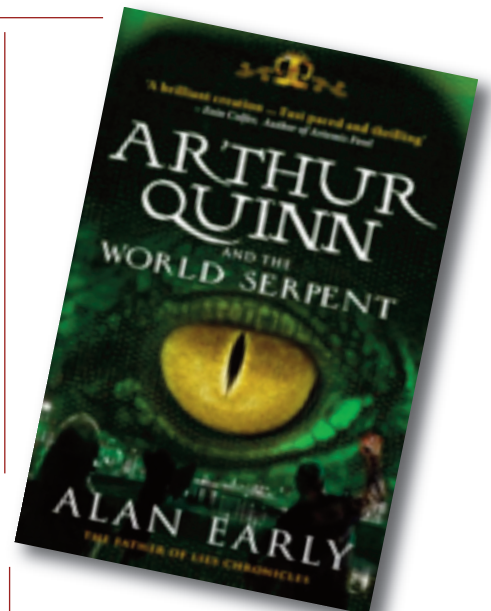
Alan held two workshops, one with class Kestrel and another with class Lark. These workshops included a game show

September Trip

The Geography department is delighted to announce an overnight trip in September 2014. This will cover vital parts of the senior cycle curriculum at two of Ireland's most amazing geological sites.

First stop will be The Marble Arch Cave system in Fermanagh. The Marble Arch Caves Global Geopark is host to one of Europe's finest showcaves allowing visitors to explore a fascinating, natural underworld of rivers, waterfalls, winding passages and lofty chambers. Lively and informative guides conduct tours of a bewildering variety of cave formations – stalactites glisten above stream ways and chambers while fragile mineral veils and cascades of creamy calcite coat walls and spread as shimmering terraces across rock strewn floors. Spectacular walkways allow easy access while powerful lighting reveals the stunning beauty and grandeur of the caves. Electrically powered boats glide through huge caverns carrying visitors along a subterranean river.

That evening will include some economic geography, with a shopping trip to Victoria Square in Belfast.

The second day will be a detailed tour of the Giants Causeway and a trip across Carrick-a-Rede ropebridge for the brave! The Giant's Causeway provides a glimpse into the Earth's most ancient past. For this reason, it was designated a World Heritage Site by UNESCO.

Made up of over 40,000 interlocking basalt columns, the Giant's Causeway is the result of intense volcanic activity millions of years ago.

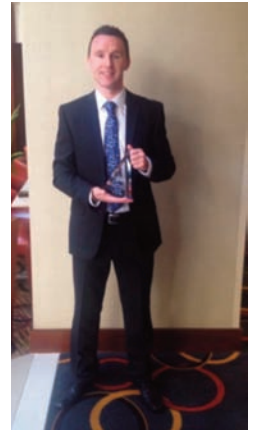
The ceremony took place in the National Museum in Washington DC. The event was a celebration of the 20th Anniversary of NFTE worldwide.

Transition Year Trip: 1916 Skyline Tour of Croke Park

Accompanied by an experienced tour guide, a group of TY students had the experience of climbing to a walkway forty four metres above the ground to take in panoramic views of Dublin and find out more about Dublin's key landmarks.

The Skyline included stops at five viewing platforms along Croke Park's 0.6 km rooftop walkway. Each stop gave students the opportunity to learn about the highlighted buildings and sites in their line of vision through multi-lingual audio guides. The amusing tour guide gave a detailed account of historical information, quirky anecdotes and outlined some interesting facts about Dublin's famous locations.

Students had the opportunity to walk from the stadium onto a specially designed walkway suspended above the Croke Park pitch. Not for the faint hearted, the view of Croke Park showed the famous field from a completely different angle. It was an experience everyone enjoyed!

"On the 26th of March the TY classes went on the Croke Park 1916 Skyline tour. When we first arrived we watched a quick history video and then put on our harnesses. CLAIRE BOGAN (RIP)

At the kind invitation of Michael and his daughters, Corine and Sinéad, I have been asked to say a few words on behalf of the school community of St. Mary's Holy Faith, Glasnevin, and to attempt to distil the essence of the unique role Claire played as a serving teacher in the school. No words of mine will suffice and thus, the testimony of the students in the past few days will weave the narrative of Claire's story which began in St. Mary's Glasnevin at the age of 5 and had an untimely and premature ending on Wednesday, 12 March, at 4.45 p.m. at the age of 54.

Claire was at heart a quintessential Holy Faith girl. Her early formative years were spent in the private primary school in Glasnevin. Her



contemporaries recall her, all these years later, as the ultimate 'model student' who radiated exemplary behaviour even as a very small child – they were put beside her in the vain hope that her goodness might permeate their very beings by osmosis! In the roll call of remembering in recent days, an image has been conjured up of a small girl silently and meticulously practising Irish dancing steps under the desk in junior classes. Upon completion of her second level schooling, Claire spent a very happy and fulfilling third level interlude in what was then St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, and thrived particularly on her study of Irish and Classics in her B.A.

She swiftly winged her way back to

CLAIRE BOGAN (RIP)

Holy Faith Glasnevin, having attained her H. Dip., to embark on a distinguished teaching career lasting thirty two years, during which she touched the lives of countless generations of students.

When the foundress of the Holy Faith Order, Margaret Aylward, established her first school in 1861, she stated clearly that she wished her schools to be *Schools of faith* – “a faith that is living and operative”, *Schools for all*, no matter what their background or academic ability, and *Schools* that educated students with an appreciation of *Irish culture*. Those very founding principles are the hallmarks of Claire’s pedagogical career in St. Mary’s.

Her whole life was premised upon her strong Catholic faith, nurtured in her home by her parents as a child, and built upon in school and honed all her adult life. Her deep faith underpinned all the relationships in her school life. It was indeed living and operative every minute of every day as testified by over seven hundred students and countless staff in the past week.

‘Do unto others as you would have them do to you’ was her life’s maxim. And thus, she reached out daily to students who were repeatedly touched by:

- *Her smile*: which students variously recall as ‘radiant, uplifting, massive, so heartwarmingly nice’.
- *Her Wise Words*: she asked how I was every day, she remembered my mam was sick, she told me everything would work out, she never forgot my name, she encouraged me with her words and made me believe that I could do it. If you were sick, had a little fight or even a bigger problem, her words always made me feel better. Once in 1st Year I was on my own and she came over and cheered me up with her words.
- *Her kind gestures*: (These are just a tiny sampling)
 - i) She asked me each day if I needed money for lunch or bus fare
 - ii) She encouraged me to put more nutella on my toast at Breakfast Club!
 - iii) She sat with me for lots of extra time after school because she believed I could do Higher Level
 - iv) She stayed with me at lunch time whenever I was sick
 - v) She slipped me bars of chocolate when I was stressed

- vi) She got me endless cups of tea when I was down
- vii) She helped me at the Céilí and said I was good when I kept falling
- viii) She said a prayer for everyone who needed it – I found that so comforting
- ix) She listened to stories about my puppies Lou and Gizmo
- x) When I got my needles and fainted in the hall she helped pick me up
- xi) She was the kindest person I ever met

And perhaps the ultimate accolade – “*She was like a nanny to me!*”.

In the roll call of memories of how Claire touched the students’ lives, the following are words of appreciation expressed by the girls.

- Thank you for welcoming me into St. Mary’s on my first day in the school
- Thank you for never failing to pass a friendly word on the corridor
- Thank you for leaving a legacy of goodness for all who were very lucky to have been taught by you
- Thank you for giving me hope and strengthening my faith when I needed it most
- Thank you for always praying for my country, the Philippines, particularly after the typhoon
- Thank you for your love of God and the Irish language
- Thank you for believing in me when I was doubting myself.

Claire’s teaching of the Irish language elicited from students a sustained and positive response and engendered a love of all things Irish. Several hundred students have alluded to the joy of her daily salutation of ‘maith an cailín’. They recalled her endless patience and her understanding of all efforts made despite their standard of Irish. Many students made reference to how much they respect the spoken language because of the sustained encouragement of Mrs. Bogan – she often quoted Barack Obama’s iconic exhortation – ‘Is féidir linn’ to the cailíni in her care. And starting the class with ‘Sé do bheatha Mhuire’ or Hail Mary. She was even known to pray for Dublin for Sam in 2013!

On a somewhat more serious note, Claire’s contribution to the development of St. Mary’s in the past decade was seminal in the field of

School Development Planning. She was meticulous by nature and highly organized administratively. Having completed a Diploma in Planning in NUIG she embarked with passion and competence on embedding S.D.P. in the culture of St. Mary’s and wrought deep and meaningful change in teaching and learning in the school – enabling it to enter the 21st century with professional ease. The detail of the school plan confounded and amazed the most seasoned of inspectors on their visits to St. Mary’s – never more so upon completion of the WSE in January 2012 when the Senior Inspector admitted she had never seen such copious or impressive sets of plans.

Claire’s colleagues and friends on the staff deeply respected her professional capabilities and were in awe of her mastery of planning. But, like the student body, it was her personal qualities that touched us all deeply. Her beloved friend, Aideen, bridesmaid at her wedding, compiled a litany of attributes that she ascribed to Claire. These include many cited by the students, but also those of loyalty, reliability, integrity, compassion and honesty. Claire’s kindness to young teachers bore no bounds and her ability to mark occasions with cards was legendary. Cards for births, bereavements, anniversaries, inspections and celebrations. Indeed, the very last task Claire completed the night before her illness struck was to make cards for the two young teachers who trained the victorious camogie teams upon winning the Dublin championship the previous day.

And so Claire, like your beloved poppy, a potent symbol of remembrance in World War One, we will remember you as you remembered all who died on Armistice Day each year. A student likened your heart to the red poppy ‘beautiful and precious, gentle as that flower that you so loved’. May you watch over us all and guide us with that gentle love.

We pray, as we part with you,

Go mbeannaí Dia agus Muire d’anam uasal Gaelach. Go dtuga Naomh Brid agus Naomh Pádraig solás agus síocháin duit sna fláithis. Tá tú ar do shuaimneas anois I gcuideachta Dé. Codladh sámh, a thaisce.
