The programme is an initiative by the German Embassy and the Goethe-Institut Irland, and is developed in close association with key Irish educational institutions and business. German School Trip

An early start of 4:20 am in Dublin airport began the adventure for sixty two students and six teachers on their four day tour of Germany and Austria. Munich was the base for the four day tour.

The first activity was a guided tour of the city where we saw the beer hall where the Nazi party was formed as well as buildings connected with this period. This included the Fuhrer Bau, Hitler's Offices, where the Munich agreement was signed and it is one of the best surviving examples of Third Reich architecture in Germany. On the tour we passed the key parade squares and the hotel where the SS was formed.

After the tour we went to the Christmas markets at Marienplatz. Every holiday season, Marienplatz is home to Munich's famous "Christkindlmarkt" which has been celebrated here since 1642. The last activity of the day was an evening bowling and it was a great end to the first day.





On day two we headed to Nuremberg. We visited the Memorium Nuremberg Trials which informed us about the background, progression and repercussions of the trials, at the original location where they were held. From here we went to Nuremberg's southern districts. The remains of the buildings on the former Nazi Party Rally Grounds, with their immense proportions, are a vivid testimony to the megalomania of the National Socialist regime. This area of eleven square kilometres was intended as an impressive backdrop for the Nazi party rallies staged to demonstrate its power. We ended our tour of Nuremberg in the Christmas markets. Later that evening we went ice-skating in the Olympic Park.

The last day we visited Dachau. On March 22, 1933, a few weeks after Adolf Hitler had been appointed Reich Chancellor, a concentration camp for political prisoners was set up in Dachau. The camp served as a model for all concentration camps as a "school of violence" for the SS men who ran it stood. In the twelve years of its existence over 200,000 persons from all over Europe were imprisoned there, including one Irish man! More than 43,000 people died. The tour was a moment to remember the horror and to never forget the innocent people who died there. On April 29 1945, American troops liberated the survivors. The last event on our tour was the all-important time for shopping and then we started our journey home.

On the first day in Paris, we took a seat on the deck of the Bateau Parisien and sailed down the River Seine to admire the architectural treasures and the breath-taking views of the city. That same evening, we had dinner on the Champs-Elysées, the world-famous boulevard which the French call, 'La plus belle avenue du monde'.

The second day began with our local guide bringing us on a tour around Paris to visit the city's most famous sites. Our tour ended in front of the largest and most famous museum in the world, Le Louvre. Here we had the opportunity to see some of the most famous Neo Classical and Renaissance paintings and sculptures, including the most renowned painting by Leonardo da Vinci "Mona Lisa". That evening we visited The Cathedral of Notre-Dame, had ice-cream while walking around The Ile de la Cité and went to Paris's Hard Rock Café for our evening meal.

The third day was a whole day in Disneyland Resort Paris!!

Our final day in Paris began with a walk up the steps of Le Sacré-Coeur. Following that we visited the fabulous Chateau de Versailles, the former residence of the Court of France!


We ended our adventurous few days in Les Quatre Temps Shopping Centre, the largest shopping centre in Paris where we got our last-minute souvenirs!

Gaisce - The Irish President's Award

The President's Award is a three-tiered personal development programme challenge from the President of Ireland for young people aged fifteen to twenty-five. It is a self-directed personal development programme for young people in the Non-Formal Education sector. This year students in fourth year have been given the opportunity to challenge for the Bronze Gaisce Medal. Forty-five pupils have taken up the challenge! The Bronze Medal takes a minimum of twenty-six weeks. If all four requirements of the challenge are completed by the student, she will receive a medal and certificate from Gaisce.

There are four areas of involvement:

- 1) **Community Involvement:** 1 hour per week over 13 weeks
- 2) **Personal Skill:** 1 hour per week over 13 weeks
- 3) **Physical Recreation:** 1 hour per week over 13 weeks

When the student completes thirteen weeks they must complete another thirteen weeks in one of the three areas which adds to twenty-six weeks.

4) Adventure Activity: Planning, preparing and undertaking a two days/one night Adventure Journey camping and hiking (22km) fulfils this requirement.

What's it all about? It's about challenging yourself.

Gaisce - the President's Award works on the basis of a personal challenge set by the participant. The participant will set the challenge and get the agreement of a President's Award leader (PAL). Participants don't compete with other participants as each challenge is completely individual, so the only person you compete with is yourself.

Best of luck to all the participants. Let's hope they all achieve their award!!!

The Maths Department and students in the school had an exciting first term. The following events took place in the Maths Department during the first term:



Fifth Years—Fifth years watching the film '21' in the choir hall and thoroughly enjoyed it!




Maths Department






