Our senior and junior camogie teams are also through to the semi-finals promising a very exciting start to the New Year in sporting terms. 1st Year CSPE

This year sees the beginning of the new CSPE short course, which is an important part of the Wellbeing programme in St. Mary's. It is built around three strands:

Rights and Responsibilities

Global Citizenship

Exploring Democracy

The CSPE course enables students to feel connected to and take responsibility for the wellbeing of others. In CSPE class, a wide variety of methodologies are used to inform, inspire, empower and enable young people to participate as active citizens in contemporary society at local, national and global levels.

In class this term, the students studied the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, investigated the persecution of the Rohingya people in Myanmar, researched inspirational Irish personalities with disabilities such as Joanne O'Riordan and had a walking debate about the problem of the homeless in Ireland.

History, Politics & Society Trip

On November 30th Leaving Cert History and Politics & Society students took a trip to Northern Ireland along with Ms Hayes, Ms Griffin, Ms O Doherty, Mr Montague and Mr Farrell. The girls started their tour arriving in Derry, firstly heading to the Museum of Free Derry, located in the Bogside where they were welcomed by the Educational Officer, John Kelly. He gave an educational talk and demonstrations about the events of The Troubles, and his own personal accounts of Bloody Sunday. Afterwards the girls got to look around the museum and look at documents, photographs and artefacts of The Civil Rights Movement, Bloody Sunday and The Troubles, finishing with a walking tour of the famous murals of Derry and to the sites of the main events of The Troubles.

Finally the girls had the chance to take a class photo at the infamous Free Derry Wall. A short time later, they arrived at the Apprentice Boys of Derry Hall. The girls received a tour of the club, and an educational walkthrough on the historical background to the Apprentice Boys of Derry. Finishing the evening at the EverGlades Hotel, having a lovely dinner and settling in their pyjamas watching the movie *Elf* together. Up bright and early the next day the girls met with their tour guide, Peter Monaghan for a walking tour of infamous Walls Of Derry. The girls learned a lot about the history behind the walled city. Afterwards it was back on the road again, heading to Northern Ireland's capital city of Belfast. First arriving at Stormont Northern Ireland's parliament building, they got to take a group photo on the building's grand staircase and sit in the assembly room. They got an interesting view of Stormont's history, and symbolic meaning behind the parliament.

The girls then got to see interesting pictures of Stormont during its involvement in World War II and finished with a question and answer session with their Educational Officer. At the end of the day they were out for a fun evening of bowling. On the final day the girls headed out to the Titanic Museum and got the opportunity to look at the history of the ship being built in Belfast and look at replicates of rooms onboard the Titanic. Afterwards everyone got the chance to go shopping for a few hours in Belfast's Victoria Square before getting a bus tour of Belfast, its historical buildings and a drive down The Falls and The Shankill roads. Finally the girls got to stop at The Peace Wall, where they wrote peaceful and inspirational messages on the wall. We finished our trip to Northern Ireland with an evening drive home. Everyone had a great time and loved creating school memories we will defiantly take with us into the future.

5th Year Politics and Society

Well done to the Fifth year Politics and Society class who completed their first presentation before the midterm. Politics and Society class is based on a democratic and student led environment and students have been engaging in debates and covering theorists such as Hobbes and Locke since September. As we began to look at different views on the political spectrum - left verses right, students decided to divide into pairs and pick a different political party in the Irish context and explore where their policies are on the political spectrum. Students then presented their findings to the class and as a group determined where each party would fall on the spectrum.

Students then developed their own political parties and created their own policies they would like to see the government adopt. Some of them were extremely interesting such as changes to the education policies in Ireland and reducing taxation on sanitary products.

As part of their Christmas assessment students further applied this learning to an action project in which they conducted research and composed a proposal or suggested amendments to current school policy. Interesting proposals included the implementation of a compulsory 5th year bonding trip, examining the suggested changes to the current school day and the introduction of an after-school meals programme for supervised study and students engaging in extra-curricular activities. During the Bronze Age our ancient ancestors began using gold to create beautiful and fashionable necklaces, bracelets, armlets and earrings called Torcs and Lunalae. A piece of gold would have been hammered flat until it became a thin sheet – like gold foil. Then the circular disc shape was cut out using a sharp tool.

Well done to class 2 Sheehy for completing their Age of Exploration model assessment. Each student had to design and present their model, which will count towards their Christmas written exam. Students made various items such as Caravel ships, logbooks and different tools of navigation like a compass, quadrant and astrolabe. The Young Scientist Exhibition will take place from Wednesday 10th January to Friday 13th January in the RDS and St Mary's will be represented in the Social and Behavioural Science category by Transition Year students Lauren McGuinness and Sarah Brady.

Well done to these students as they have been one of the 550 projects selected out of a total of the 2,033 projects submitted for consideration into the competition this year. Their project is entitled 'An Investigation into Televised Road Safety Campaigns, to see if they are having a lasting impact on Young Teenagers' Attitudes Towards Drink and Drug Driving.' The aim of their project is to analyse and test several factors and stimuli present in both national and international campaigns to compare their effectiveness with target audiences of young offenders.

Their main student sampling cohort will be with senior cycle students and teachers will also be involved. The data will be obtained by using several different social science methods including quantitative questionnaires, qualitative interviews and visual sampling tests to obtain their data. The visual sampling tests will be carried out by organising focus groups to get more in depth responses and results. By carrying out this research, Lauren and Sarah hope to make recommendations after they have identified the key factors that make an advert effective which will ultimately resonate with young viewers and make them think twice before driving under the influence of drink or drugs.
