ART DEPARTMENT

September began on a great note with the arrival of our Junior Cert. Art results. The students did very well and we are proud to exhibit a selection of their work in the school. The prints, paintings, graphic designs, embroidery and batik on display are a great inspiration to our present 3rd Year students who are working hard exploring their art project themes.

First Year students have studied the principles of drawing and painting. They are applying this knowledge to a painting project concentrating on tints, tones, complementary colours and geometric shapes. The art elements will also be the foundation for lino-printing work based on 'China Cabinet Fly' by John Kindness (Graphic Studio/ 50 Years In Dublin- Irish Museum of Modern Art) and a representational printed series inspired by the work of Edvard Munch.

The Second Year art students have completed wonderful clay heads in 3D based on their self-portraits. They have also created posters influenced by Autumn and are currently learning stitching techniques in preparation for embroidery design.

All our Transition Year students visited The European Union House, Dawson St. to view the 'EU Street Art Exhibition', presented by the artist Fiona Mullholland. A guided tour of the National Gallery, Merrion Square, followed directly and the students had the opportunity to view, discuss and compare the various works they had seen that day.

The first T.Y module was a collaboration with the music department and students explored the relationship between art and music inspired by the work of Wassily Kandinsky and Malin. They created expressive individual paintings using mixed media in response to chosen pieces of music which were filmed at the end of the project. The second art module concentrates on the entries to the D.I.Y. T.Y competition to be held at St. Michael's Holy Faith School in the New Year. Fantastic costumes will appear on stage made from recycled materials.

Fifth Years have focused on Modern Irish painters. They have used the painting styles and techniques of Irish Artists such as Louis le Brocquy and Paul Henry as inspiration for their individual pieces. The final presentation is an interesting pod-cast. They have also perfected their stitching techniques and have created an embroidery design using these stitches.

A visit to the 'Sculpture In Context' exhibition at The Botanic Gardens began this eventful year for our Sixth Year Art students. They are busy preparing for the Still Life and Craft Leaving Cert. exams. A gallery trip to 'The Moderns' exhibition at the Irish Museum of Modern Art will further their studies in Art History and Appreciation.

Students are also participating in several art competitions such as the Texaco Children's Art Competition, Design a Cover Art Project 2010 (for Mental Health Ireland), and Doodle for Google. The Art Department wish all our students well in their creative endeavours.



We were then given a sheet on Democracy to test our knowledge of it. Then we went and sat in the gallery of the Dáil while the Taoiseach Brian Cowen was being questioned on his expenditure. It was interesting to hear the opposition parties insulting his running of the country.

Next we went to the Seanad and on our way the tour guide taught us the history of Leinster House. In the Seanad, senators were speaking about Head Shops and whether they should be illegal in Ireland. It was a controversial topic. Finally our tour guide told us about when John F. Kennedy came to Ireland and Bill Clinton's visit to the Dáil. Once the tour had finished we went and got our bags and said goodbye to our tour guide. Then we got the bus back to school. It was a great experience which we all enjoyed as a class.

MATHS DEPARTMENT

The Maths department and all students in the school had a busy, eventful, exciting, fun-filled first term. Both first and fifth years were introduced to statistics which is one of the new strands on the Project Maths course. This new strand generated great discussion of mathematical class content and students were eager to participate in class discussions. Thanks to the helpers in the Maths Club. They met first years every Thursday in the library to engage in problem solving. Well done to Patricia O'Beirne who was invited to take part in the warm-up classes for the International Mathematical Olympiad training programme in the University of Maynooth. The following events proved very exciting and stimulating for the students involved.

Mathematical Modelling Summer School

On the 21st-25th June, Katherine Joy Leal from class 6.37 and Suzanne Escalante from class 6.34 travelled to the University of Limerick for MACSI (Mathematics Applications Consortium for Science and Industry) mathematical modelling summer school 2010. Approximately fifty second level students ranging from 16-18 years of age from around Ireland were awarded a place in this residential summer school. Overall the girls felt that the

mathematical summer school offered them a glimpse of mathematical modelling in action, with visits to industrial sites such as some of MACSI's industrial partners, RUSAL Aughinish, Vistakon and Analog Devices. The girls also developed their problem solving skills and learned about various applications of maths. They really enjoyed two lectures in particular; the lecture given by Ms. Sarah Mitchell on the mathematics behind Origami and the lecture given by Mr. James Gleeson which focused on Modelling randomness and complexity. Suzanne and Catherine participated in some Physics tricks where they did Physics related experiments. The girls thought that the week was a worthwhile experience as they learned a lot about mathematics and applications of maths in domains as varied as the aviation industry and art. The students were grateful to Ms. Murphy who organised the event and travelled to Limerick with the girls.

- **Transition Years** – All TY students took part in the Hamilton Walk to Broombridge. They also involved themselves in the National Maths PRISM competition which is an annual event run every year in Ireland during Maths Week. It involves a series of problem solving mathematical questions for secondary school students. Well done to Ciara Ryan and Orla Fennelly (pictured below) both from classroom 4.27 who were the school winners in the competition. In addition to the aforementioned activities, TY students also enjoyed a maths class solving Sudoku puzzles!
- **Fifth Years** – Fifth Year students did one of the

following during their maths classtime. They either watched snippets from 'The Story of Maths' video by Marcus Du Sautoy, did Sudoku puzzles or they participated in a 'Maths 'n Music' lesson with Mr.Coll. The music lesson related to maths as Mr. Coll allowed the students to discover how note values can be transferred into a rhythm. Each specific note has an individual value of usually 0.5, 1, 2, or 4 beats. The number values were important in order to make

up a rhythm that would work. All the fifth year maths students involved in the lesson placed themselves in groups and made up bars of music with four beats in every bar. The students then thoroughly enjoyed performing their rhythms.

- **Sixth Years** – They had an opportunity to attend a careers talk given by Orla Donoghue regarding Science/Maths courses that are available at U.C.D.



Over 180 universities, higher education colleges, further education colleges, organisations and professional bodies were in attendance giving students an unrivalled opportunity to discuss college choices and entry procedures. It was an excellent opportunity for students to avail of information on choice and entry procedures to Irish and UK higher and further level institutions.

Careers Evening

A highly successful careers evening took place in St. Michael's in Finglas on Wednesday 3rd November. Fourth, Fifth and Sixth year students from St. Mary's, Beneavin De La Salle, St. Michael's, Colaiste Eoin and Mater Christi participated in the event. Over 47 colleges and organisations were in attendance on the night and it gave the students the chance to meet up with the college representatives to discuss their career options. There was a great turn out of students from St. Mary's at the event.

Better Options 2010

A unique one-day event for Sixth Year students with a disability or specific learning difficulty took place on Tuesday 30th November in Trinity College. This was a key event for students to learn about DARE – Disability Access Route to

St Mary's is one of the services included in the directory and has been actively involved in the Task Force.
