The TY students were assessed on their personal technique, presentation and teaching skills during the teaching practice. They completed an evaluation on their Teaching and Personal skills.

Content – What They Learned

To plan a series of skills, activities and games to teach the children. Tips and guidelines for teaching and coaching. The skills and activities required to demonstrate and teach various activities to the children.

The qualities of a Leader and Coach

On completion the ability to: plan, organise and manage a session safely, introduce oneself, develop an understanding of skills, use coaching/leadership styles to help children learn and create a fun, safe and structured session.

Haiti Timeline

The St. Mary's Amnesty group wanted to do something to highlight the devastation and destruction caused by the earthquake in Haiti. The aim was to ensure that the victims of the earthquake were not forgotten about.

It was decided that an effective way of keeping the school community updated was to create a Haiti timeline, which would be displayed in a prominent place on the first corridor. The timeline consisted of newspaper articles, photographs, reports, statistics and other information on Haiti.

Incoming First Years

Summer term involved the planning for our new intake of students to St. Mary's in August 2010. To help facilitate the transition from Primary school to Secondary school we visited the primary schools and talked with the Sixth Class teachers about the students' progress and interests. There was a very positive information meeting with the parents of incoming First Years to review the issues for students and parents and to initiate our long term partnership over the next five or six years. To further this partnership we invited any of the incoming first year parents to make an appointment at the end of May for an informal interview with a member of the Care Team.

First Years

There was a meeting with the parents of the present First Year students to look at subject choice for Second Year. The counsellors also met with the students and distributed booklets about their subject choices.

Third Years

The Third Year students sat their Differential Aptitude tests (DATS). This was to help those going on into Fifth Year with making their subject choices. They each received a booklet outlining what was involved in the study of subjects for the traditional Leaving Certificate. Each Third Year student had a meeting with the guidance counsellors to receive feed back on the results of the DATS. The Third Year students with their parents attended a meeting to look at the options for next year: Transition Year; Fifth Year; LCVP.

16+Task Force

The 16+ Task Force was formed in 2007 to address the need for a multi-agency approach to meet the needs of young people aged 16 and over who are disengaged or at risk of disengaging from service providers and to create a structure and process to work with individuals, placing paramount importance on their best interests. The task force has established a Service Directory that maps out the roles of the services in the area and provides a simple and effective point of contact for other agencies and the young people in the Finglas/Cabra area. St Mary's is one of the services included in the directory and has been actively involved in the Task Force.

Much greater emphasis will be placed on student understanding of mathematical concepts, with increased use of contexts and applications that will enable students to relate mathematics to everyday experience. The fifth year students have futher developed their understanding of form, colour and composition through their observations of still life. They worked on a t-shirt design project that is based on a block study of printing, graphic and product design. Other fifth year art students completed of a large textile project inspired by the work of Henri Matisse, Vincent Van Gogh, Gustav Klimt and Edvard Munch. Francis Bacon: A Terrible Beauty

At the Hugh Lane Gallery on March 5th, an exhibition dedicated to Francis Bacon took the attention of the 6th year students.

After travelling there by bus, we were greeted by a cheerful, well informed tour guide who took us through the life of Francis Bacon. Through pictures and photos we were told of Bacon's background: his youth, travels and his inspirations, which led to work he did until his death in 1992.

The most interesting display at the gallery was his studio. Donated in 1998, Bacon's studio was relocated here, with every last piece in its original place. A mass of paints, papers, images, photos, ripped canvases and material clutter this tiny art studio where Bacon once said, "I feel at home in this chaos." It was certainly the most important room in the artist's life.

Another appealing quality to Bacon's work is not how he put paint onto canvas or how the finished piece looked, but how he reached his decision on what would go on the canvas.

Over a quarter of the material found in his studio was photographs from which he painted. In folding, ripping and twisting pages of photographs of human bodies, Bacon would find his subject to paint.

After visiting all of Bacon's work, we climbed the stairs to take part in "Francis Bacon", an inspired workshop. We were taught by another Bacon enthusiast how to express images and emotions through body art.

It was great craic and I'd say we did Francis Bacon proud!

All in all, I thoroughly enjoyed visiting the gallery and seeing Francis Bacon's work and would advise everyone to go see the exhibition
