


'Flying with pride'

Other students delivered passionate speeches on the Homeless in Ireland or the importance of Education for both the individual and the nation.

All in all Bluebell excelled in practicing their oratory prowess and can finish this term with the knowledge that they are quickly becoming responsible and active citizens.



3rd year CSPE update

Our third year Civic, Social and Political Education student's are now busy at work preparing for the last ever State Exam in CSPE. CSPE has always been a very active learning experience for students, with a large component of their Junior Cycle grade achieved through continuous work on an Action Project.

Classes are challenged to work together to achieve a common goal, organise themselves to share the work as a team to make a difference to an area they feel strongly about over the course of their studies. This year the girls have focused on raising funds and awareness for very worthwhile non-profit organisations in aid of the homeless, animal welfare, suicide prevention and age action.

Though the State Exam will no longer be a feature, students will still actively engage in worthwhile action projects to try and make a difference to the world they live in. To this end, our first years have already "taken action" by arranging a collection of non-perishable baby food, formula and sanitary products for homeless families with small children this Christmas.

Politics & Society Department

On Monday 15th of October, the 5th and 6th year Politics and Society students visited Irish Aid and Dáil Éireann as part of a trip to learn more about our government and how we as a country can help other countries in need.

The classes were split into two groups, one visiting The Dáil first and the other visiting Irish Aid first. In Irish Aid, we had a talk from a woman named Caoimhe, who told us about the Sustainable Development Goals, and how we could help other countries. We also participated in a role-playing workshop, in which we learned about poverty and how the quality of living can be a gamble in places like Malawi. It showed the unpredictability of life in countries that are not as wealthy and involved us having to decide whether to think for ourselves or try to benefit everyone as a community.

In Dáil Éireann, we were permitted to visit committee rooms. In there, we were told about how TDs and Ministers would give answers to reporters, and the “3/9/27” rule of giving an answer that is vague, but informative enough that it does not encourage follow-up questions. We then practiced these by creating three points, nine seconds per point, and twenty-seven words to discuss the current budget.

As the final part of the visit to The Dáil, we put what we had been discussing in class to use and debated the motion that “The Voting Age Should Be Reduced From 18 To 16”. One group’s results were extremely close as the ratio of people who agreed with the motion compared to the people against the motion was 13:11.

All in all, it was an extremely enjoyable and informative day, and we would like to thank the teachers involved for organising such a great trip.

5th Year Politics and Society Christmas Project

Well done to 5th year Politics students on completing their Action Reports on 'The Use of Palm Oil', which will be 10% towards their exam. As a class, students voted on choosing a topic related to the Politics course and designed an action plan around that issue. After viewing the moving Greenpeace Palm Oil Cartoon that Iceland had hoped to release as part of their Christmas campaign, (but was banned by advertisers as 'being too political'), students chose this as their topic with the aim of highlighting the use of palm oil across the school community.

The girls decided to divide themselves into groups, one group wrote, edited and created a 5 minute documentary on the use of palm oil, another group designed posters to raise awareness and a final group designed a survey on survey monkey to gather data on how well informed the school community is on this issue. Students then led a workshop with 1 Celandine and 1 Dandelion CSPE and Geography classes where they informed students, asked first years to complete the survey and carried out a question and answer session.

Space Week






BT Young Scientist

After a busy year we look forward to great start to 2019 for our Junior Science students when they complete their Classroom Based Assessments in the New Year.




An Coiste Gaelbhrtach, The Green School's Committee & The Art Club

Senior Cycle Public Speaking News!

Soroptimist International is a global organisation which inspires action and creates opportunities to transform the lives of women and girls around the world. One of the ways they provide a global voice for women is by holding annual public speaking competition for girls.

To prepare the participants representing our school, Ms Doyle invited Noel Rock TD, a highly experienced public speaker, to host a workshop at the beginning of the year. In the workshop students learnt different skills, techniques and valuable information which they could apply to their speeches when preparing for the competition.



In the days before the competition, after thorough research and numerous drafts, Alannah McDonald and I performed our speeches in front of teachers and class groups, where we received feedback that truly helped us on the highly anticipated day.

On the day of the competition, twenty three girls from schools all around Dublin presented their speeches on one of several topics: human rights, health, environment, democracy, friendship and volunteering, education or empowerment of women. I chose to discuss education and offered alternative solutions to improve our quality of education, no matter what background one may have - "If we fail to notice the pitfalls in our education system, formal education will continue to be seen as anything but life itself. We need a form of education that doesn't stunt our growth and innovation but rather nurtures it."

I was extremely nervous as I stood before the podium and the audience. It was unlike anything I had done before but I love a challenge. Passion outweighed fear and we delivered our speeches to the best of our abilities.

Although none of the entries from our school made it to the next round, the confidence and empowerment felt as your voice is heard is indescribable. This opportunity taught me valuable life skills and confidence which was reward enough (although the Newbridge Silverware jewellery did not go a miss). I would encourage students to step outside their comfort zone as it teaches you skills that are as paramount as the ones you learn in the classroom.

Breakfast Club 2018-19



5th Years watched 'Hidden Figures' which they thoroughly enjoyed. Maths, intelligence, feminism and glamour all rolled into one spectacular movie.



Many of the first years were busy in the Botanic Gardens not only doing the trail but also using their 'Maths Eyes' to photograph anything mathematical they could see.



Get Up & Go Goals


At the moment 5th year art classes are developing a craft project in response to the level of plastic pollution in our oceans as part of St Mary's 'Get up and Goals!'



St Mary's Biodiversity Plan

We were successful in receiving a Local Agenda 21 grant from Dublin City Council to develop biodiversity in the schools Sensory Garden.

The grant has covered the cost of 5 new water butts to increase our self-sufficiency and ensure that we are using rain water only to water our plants - making them happy and using a free natural resource.



Two teachers and twelve students from the green schools committee took a trip to Bí Urban in Stonybatton to learn about the importance of pollinators with a particular focus on bees. It was a sweet trip that included a delicious honey tasting exercise, as well as getting the opportunity to view a sample selection of Nature RX notebooks, part of a nature journaling exercise that they ran over the summer months in conjunction

with DIT Visual Communication students. We were so inspired by this that we have set up our own Nature Journaling group of students and teachers, who meet once a month to discuss what we observed from an hour spent in our local environment. Kaethe Burt O'Dea hopes to visit St Mary's in the new year and attend our nature Journaling meeting

TY students in their birds and biodiversity module have gotten involved in the creation of insect hotels using recycled materials with a compost bed planned for assembly in the new year. A wormery was also constructed and put in place by Mr Montague, Ms O'Keefe and Mr McGill.

A raised wetland bed and pond as well as improvements to our existing pond were other benefits of the grant. While work has begun, this habitat will be fully ready in spring to give frogs and water insects a much welcome new and diverse habitat.

In the meantime, new homes have also been created by the addition of small bird boxes, bat boxes and swift boxes. Introducing homes for these creatures will greatly add to the biodiversity of the school grounds. A wormery was also constructed and put in place by Mr Montague, Ms O'Keefe and Mr McGill.

We are very grateful for the grant and really looking forward to observing the positive effects of these investments into our school grounds and using them as teaching and learning spaces in the months and years to come.

LCVP St Mary's Girls are Taking Action!

This term our LCVP students are focusing on making changes. After Christmas there will be a campaign underway to educate our school community on "Period Poverty".

Most women can agree that periods are an annoyance at the best of times. They can leave you feeling fatigued, irritable and sore, which in turn can curtail your productivity and ability to go about your day-to-day life.

But for some women, periods are more than an biological nuisance – they're a financial burden. A quick glance at an online supermarket reveals that brand name sanitary products can cost anything between €2.69 and €4.95 per standard pack.

This adds up, particularly when you take into account the fact that a woman can easily go through more than one pack per month. Forced to make the choice between basic essentials like food and tampons, some women will choose to forego sanitary products and resort to other means.

There's a term for this: 'period poverty'.

Our 6th year students plan on setting up a donation hub where our school community can donate sanitary items to those in need. This will be passed on to "The Homeless Period Dublin" who distribute the products to women in direct provision, women's shelters and homeless women.


